To me, the best thing about Dolphin Cay is the people. Everyone cares about how our property looks. We have been busy this summer making repairs and improvements.

- The gatehouse has been repaired and painted for the first time since it was built. A few more improvements are coming.
- The Butterfly Garden has been cleaned up and planted with new plants. ProCare will maintain it as part of their contract.
- Roof damage from Hurricane Irma has been completed. The damage was lower than the insurance deductible, so each building and Dolphin Cay had to cover the cost of repairs.
- The hot summer and rain have been great for the weeds. ProCare is keeping up with the weeds and sod replacement.
- The beach area has been cleaned up and leveled and it is the best it has looked in many years.
- The library exterior stucco was repaired and painted.
- Boards have been replaced on the walkways and we will continue to replace as needed.
- The mangroves are scheduled to be cut beginning the end of November for those areas included this year. We use a two-year plan in the cutting of the allowed areas.

 At the suggestion of our insurance company, we will be installing some additional handrails around the property.

Dolphin Cay, along with other associations in the Bayway Alliance, signed a new agreement with Spectrum, our cable tv and Wi-Fi vendor. This will go into effect on or about October 15th. Every unit is entitled to two Spectrum cable receivers and one modem at no charge. Wi-Fi and Showtime are included. Any additional equipment outside our bulk agreement will be an additional charge to residents. To start this new billing to your existing account or if you have questions, please call Spectrum.

Treasurer's Report

The most current financial report of the fiscal year 2018/2019 began April 1, 2018, and the results of operations for the 5 months ended August 31, 2018, are:

Revenue amounted to \$518,918 as compared to budget of \$514,481 or \$4,437 over budget.

Operating Expenses and Reserve Funding for the 5 months ending August 31, 2018, amounted to \$519,251 as compared to the budget of \$514,481 or \$4,770 over budget. The cause of this variance is due to the timing of the actual payment for expenses as compared to the months in which they were budgeted.

Architectural Review Committee - Cliff Allen

A reminder to all who are planning on doing some renovations this year - **PLEASE** fill out the proper forms in the management office located in the Casino. The office has all the necessary forms.

We realize how difficult it can be to get a contractor to commit to a certain date, but we need time to go over your request **BEFORE** construction begins.

There are three signatures that are needed before your project is approved - a building or homeowner representative, an ARC representative, and someone from Property Management. Some requests may need a committee meeting to take place before the request can be answered. Please keep this in mind when submitting your forms.

Work is allowed only Monday through Friday and not on holidays or weekends. If you should have any questions about improvements or the process involved, please contact the management office.

As a reminder, if you are having work done on your home/condo and you are not here to oversee the work, PLEASE have a neighbor/friend check in on the job. This can greatly reduce the number of complaints sent to the office. Such things as working too late, leaving a mess in the hallways or street, etc., are very disruptive to your neighbors.

Our Hurricane Irma tile roof repairs have been completed. We thank everyone for their patience in the process and we are happy to have our buildings looking so nice again.

Landscaping Committee - Henri Tackett

The Bromeliad garden was refurbished and refreshed this summer. It received a major cleanup around the oak tree and reduction of overgrowth including the larger Aaechmea Blanchetiana variety. For those of you who remember, the original garden was designed and established by long-time Eleuthera and Curação resident, Fred Wolf. He used mostly donated material from Shelby Gardens where he was a volunteer and routinely maintained the garden for many years. There are at least 18 different identified bromeliad species in the garden, but over time the larger Aaechmea Blanchetiana became the one visible from the road. Bromeliads were his passion and the intent was to add a tropical feel to the property and offset some of the more formal plantings elsewhere.

Last August Kathryn Scofield from Curacao joined the committee. As a member of the West Coast Bromeliad Society, she provided her insight and Society contacts that formulated the overall plan. The renovation became a two-phase project, the first being the major cleanup. Over the years, plants became very overcrowded and unattractive. Removing the



various overgrowth, weeds, and vines was a huge undertaking. Clearing the larger Aaechmea Blanchetiana would allow for viewing the back collection, and clearing/creating paths around the plant sections would allow close-up viewing. It took many man-hours to remove the dead material around the garden and in the large oak tree.

Phase two consisted of creating two smaller front sections of several Aaechmea Blanchetiana plants that were saved then replanted. Other plants were thinned out, as was the oak tree. Additional top soil was added, sod installed to fill in the bare areas, then finished with pine bark mulch. Now it's much cleaner and more manageable for ongoing maintenance. Hope you enjoy the new look.

Another area receiving a major renovation was the butterfly garden. This was just completed the end of September. After reviewing conditions over the summer, the Master Board decided it best to reestablish the area to a Florida-friendly base. Overgrown plants, fallen trees, and numerous weeds were removed plus trees and sea grapes trimmed. Our maintenance crew pressure washed and painted the wall prior to the several new plantings. The remainder received sod and appropriate areas finished with mulch. At this point, ProCare will be able to handle ongoing maintenance.

Ruth and Charles Finzer, long time Antigua residents, dedicated many years cultivating, selecting, and installing a variety of plants to the butterfly garden. The garden became a haven for many butterfly varieties. Ruth and Charlie's volunteer work and hours spent were exceptional; we will miss their devotion and commitment. The dedication plaques remain in the garden as a reminder of their long-time devotion. Future plantings will also be considered.

The Landscape Committee works to help identify and address our needs providing input to ProCare regarding ongoing maintenance and enhancements that result in our beautiful landscape. Landscape Committee meetings are usually scheduled the third Wednesday of the month in the Library and will be posted, so feel free to attend.


famous by the Brown Hotel in Louisville Kentucky. Hot Browns are the traditional sandwiches served at the Kentucky Derby).


